# Notes on Seascape

### No. 1 Soaring Seagulls

The brief introduction returns at the end of the final piece of this collection. In the 'A' section, the arpeggio melody in the treble represents the soaring seagulls while the bass accompaniment mimics the rolling waves of the ocean. In the 'B' section, the seagulls are at the surface of the water and the roles of the treble and bass are reversed. An abbreviated return of the 'A' section completes the piece.

### No. 2 Sailing

This piece follows a fairly strict sonata form up to the coda when it 'sails away into the distance' moving from F major to the distant key of B major. The moving accompaniment pattern is maintained throughout the exposition ('full speed ahead'). In the development section ('at anchor') the accompaniment rhythm decelerates in each measure stalling the forward motion. 'Full speed ahead' resumes at the recapitulation.

#### No. 3 The Orca

This piece tells the true story of a Pacific Northwest killer whale who became separated from his pod and was later reunited. The piece opens with a black key glissando, a 'breath of air' at the ocean surface. The 'A' section follows the young whale as he swims through the west coast waters. His calls are barely audible over the sound of the ocean waves. The mood of the B section is melancholy. A modified 'A' section returns and builds to a joyous climax as the whale is reunited with his pod.

#### No. 4 The Mermaid

This piece is a rondo (ABACA). In the 'A' section, the mermaid bathes in the sun. In 'B', she plunges into the sea for an exploration of the ocean floor. In 'C', the climax, she is joined by the other sea creatures in her swim. The 'A' section returns and at the coda, seagulls take flight.
